

Do Not Fly Over The Polo Field EVER!

Our club has been flying at Cactus Park since about 1985. We are neighbors with the Horse Polo Field all this time. For all this time we have had field rules that specify we DO NOT FLY OVER THE POLO FIELD. Our models pose a safety concern for the people and horses at the Polo Field. So far we have been able to have good relations with the people that run the polo field, and so far I am not aware of any incidents that have caused injuries to people or horses, or damage to any of the polo field equipment. Flying over the polo field can scare the horses and obviously poses a threat of crashing on polo field land which could cause injuries. Obviously if we don't fly there, we can't crash there.

The club held a special meeting at Cactus Park Saturday June 23 where President Keith Miller outlined new procedures and presented a map of the flying area. That map is shown on page 7 of this newsletter. Please do your utmost to comply.

Safety Report

Ron Keith – Rattlesnake Season be careful! If you get bit, **Call 911!** do **NOT** suck, cut the wound, let it bleed out for 20 - 30 seconds. Put a Dry Dressing over the wound. Take off Watch, rings etc also if the bite is on the foot take the shoe off.

If possible identify the snake that bit you, but make sure not to get too close, this can help the treatment from the medics.

Warning! Even if you chop the Head off the Snake it can still Bite you, as the nerves in the jaw stay active & the poison sack is in the head of the snake.

In our area, the only venomous snakes are rattlesnakes. In the coastal and mountain regions of San Diego County there are three kinds: the Western Rattlesnake,(1)

the Speckled Rattlesnake, (2)



and the <u>Red Diamond Rattlesnake</u> (3). In the desert is the <u>Sidewinder</u>(4)



If you must recover a plane in the wooded area, make sure to take a pole from the gate with you to beat ahead in the brush & keep your eyes open!

Striping is next. You'll likely see the specifics and a date via email; nothing firm is planned yet. When that time comes, please consider coming out for a day of striping!

Flight Patterns and Boundaries

Thank you to all who attended our emergency meeting on Saturday 6/23. To summarize, we covered the following:

- Review of boundary map/video. Attached as part of this newsletter is the map that I handed out during the meeting. The video can be viewed at https://youtu.be/d-nIMZPUyew.
- Membership will monitor the eastern flight boundary and curtail overflight of the corrals and polo field by establishing a spotter on Saturdays and Sundays from 9am to 11am. The spotter will have an air horn and two-way radio. A field marshal or any other member will monitor

the other end of the radio coms at the flight line. By "membership will monitor", I mean that we're asking any and all members to spend time at the



windsock as a spotter. I asked that members get it started on their own; grab a horn/radio/chair/ umbrella (shade) and establish the first watch. Field Marshals will help facilitate the rotation, and monitoring radios, but it's not the Field Marshals' duties to be spotters. That rests with all of us. One great idea that was brought up that we'll follow is, if you get honked, you get the next spotter shift! The Board will look into providing a couple of cheap umbrellas that can be stowed in the pin box when not needed for shade.

The plan is for roughly 30 minute rotations (four members), but if you're in the sun too long, or need a pee break, call over the radio for a relief. If the other end of the radio doesn't respond, feel free to walk back anyway and send a new spotter out once you get to the pits.

If we forget to establish a spotter, that doesn't mean that we'll secure flying. However I fully expect that the issue be remedied right away.

We also covered rule enforcement as it applies to the bylaws and field rules (i.e. rejuvenation of the Grievance Procedures). Strictly speaking - if you violate the boundary once in a day, that's your warning. Further honks and the Field Marshals may ground you for the remainder of the day after which the Safety Committee will be notified. The fun part is that, if you're honked once, you get the next shift at the boundary!

Pilots whom repeatedly or habitually struggle to observe the boundaries, whether intentionally or by way of lack of skills, may be asked to depart the club. This would be a very rare instance, but may be required to protect the privileges of the rest of the membership.

- We designated several new Field Marshals to include Ken Bryant, Gary Rold, Fred Miller, Ron Keith and Tim Peterson. I think I missed someone, but Bruce was taking good notes and should have them included in his minutes. Existing marshals include Vernon Gilmore, Dick Milhausen, Butch Weiser and of course the club officers. Thank you to those who stepped up! Field Marshals are identified by a yellow badge. As you all are aware,

the Field Marshals' responsibilities are outlined in our bylaws and their direction and decisions are to be adhered to. If a marshal grounds a pilot, that





stands for the remainder of that day and will be brought to the attention of the Safety Committee / Board. No arguing with the Field Marshals! The all fully understand that rules enforcement is critical, but that their approach must be cordial.

- Lastly we discussed the importance of aircraft integrity. If your model is in poor condition or recently had an abrupt terrestrial event, perform a close inspection of your model before it's flown again. We very recently had a model crash not far from the boundary after it had just previously bounced off the ground. The plane was very unstable and rather than cutting the throttle and setting it down, the pilot continued with unstable flight toward the east until it finally went in. Lessons learned: 1) don't fly models that aren't known to be 100% flight worthy and 2) if you run into trouble, sacrifice your plane before you risk a hazard to horses.

thinking about ordering a STEM kit or two of their chuck gliders, so kids can have some free flight gliders. We did this last weekend, and the kids had an absolute blast hot gluing the kits together and flying them in the open grass area near the booth. I'll put in an application for us to demo some flights, if possible, of some smaller flyers - if anyone has any UMX planes like a Radian, or the Vapor, or the UMX Timber, for example; I'll also bring a set of FPV goggles and we can do some FPV demos with an Inductrix FPV or possibly one of the bigger quads, depending on what sort of area we have to fly in (if we have permission to fly. I'll know more once I hear back from Maker Faire).

I've been reaching out to the clubs in the area just to see who's interested, and get some more interest going; I'll gladly supply hot glue guns and glue sticks for building, and at the very least we can have some static displays of planes, be it balsa, RTF, Flite Test kits, whatever. I know at the North County Maker Faire, the Flite Test name was the most popular, because parents found out the kids could build an RC plane with say, \$5 worth of foam board sheets that they bought at the local Dollar

Tree, and then picked up the electronics at a local hobby shop like Discount Hobby Warehouse.

I've included a few pictures to show you how our booth was set up over the weekend; I'm imagining at Balboa Park we'd have a larger area with more tables and glue guns, due to the larger number of people


