

### An Unofficial History of the Club

Our club was formed by a group (Ron Smith, Lee Main, Don Rice and two others) of RC flyers at the Santee corner of Mission Gorge and Cuyamaca St. back in 1976. I came to the flying site and the club in about 1977, after the club was formed. I believe the first President was Ron Smith. We met in the local hobby shop in Santee for several years - standing room only so we tried to keep the meetings short. The flying field was owned by the school district which allowed the local Little League to set up baseball diamonds in the area. We had to share the field, and curtail flying when baseball games were held. That area became the Trolley Station in Santee.

We moved essentially across the street to Hahn Field, a dirt embankment overlooking the river bed. It's all Shopping Center now. We had several good years there, flying sport, T-6 Racing, and Fun Fly's. The field was dirt, so we had regular work parties where several cars and pick ups dragged chain link fencing and steel beams to smooth out the regular donuts left by RV's after each rain. There was no shade and the pits were all dirt. When Hahn Corp. was getting ready to develop the land, we set up flying at two sites: a dirt strip in the middle of the gravel company land off Riverford Road and at Cactus Park. I was President (for a three years!) in 1985 when we moved officially to Cactus Park with permission from the county. We had to share the field with the BMX track which was where our upper parking is now. We often couldn't fly on Sundays because of the BMX races – their parking was on the runway. When we were flying at two fields only 1.9 miles apart, we test flew planes on the same frequency to see in there was any interference – there wasn't

Around 1987, Jerry Howell donated the

awning structure for the pits area. We had several work parties to out it up. Joe Cullum used his tractor to contour the land, actually raising the pit area above the mud lakes in winter. The runway was originally pavement used in the 1950's to 1960's for truck access to an asphalt mixing plant for paving the local freeways. The hill southeast was a DG mine for the asphalt. In the early 1990's the runway was deteriorating. Thank then Treasurer Mike Aldrich for creative financing (collecting multiple years dues and contributions) to pay for paving the whole runway and getting rid of all those 3 inch holes. Our pits were several layers of rugs contributed over the years. Thank Walt Wilson as President (for 3 years) for getting the club to clean up the pits, getting rid of the rugs and paving the pits.

Safety has always been a concern in our hobby. Originally when the club set up Cactus Park we put log posts between the pits and runway to keep taxiing models away from the pits. Later the logs were removed and replaced by a four foot fence, with openings at each pilot station – after a model flew through the pits and another plane hit a parked car behind the pits. Then we had a very dangerous "near miss". A model flew across the runway and hit the top rail of the four foot fence just inches from one of our members sitting in his wheel chair, looking away from the runway. That friend of mine But the club immediately was not hurt. installed the higher fences we have now.

In the early days, we flew using 27 MHz "Citizen Band" radios. In the 1970's we had 5 frequencies we could use – plus the 6 meter Ham band. Pilots stood in or near the "pilots box" so we could communicate for take-off, landings, and any other messages. This worked well at Santee, Hahn Field, The River Bed and early Cactus Park. But when the FCC authorized using the 50 channels in the 72 MHz Band, we ran into 3IM interference. The 1991 certified radios had a problem where two channels could cause intermodulation that interfered with a third channel. The fix was to always use the transmitters apart from each



other by 50 feet. This dictated we set up flight stations all along the pits instead of a "Pilot's Box". Now with 2.5 GHz radios the problem of interference is completely gone and there is no need for "getting the pin". But our field layout has proven to work, and we have had very few safety issues as long as we remain vigilant.

Our club dues have grown from \$1.00/month over the years. The dues increase has allowed us to keep our field in good condition and pay for increased expenses for the newsletter, meeting hall, and toilet rental at the field. Through the years we have applied a new layer of asphalt at least twice and several coats of sealer to keep the runway fit for models. These were all major expenses relying on contributions, multi-year dues and dues increases. We have to do regular maintenance on the runway at least every three years or so.

Currently the yearly dues are \$75 per year. Our club in 2019 has about 120 members. Club membership has varied over the years, with the highest membership at 235 in 2003. Many of our members are also members of other clubs in the San Diego area. A major factor in club membership is having a good field to fly our models. Of course, the cost of dues is a factor for both membership and maintaining a good flying field.



We have had annual awards banquets since the very early days to recognize achievements and the contribution of many members. Fred Miller instituted the 12th Man Awards to recognize the many members each year who do extra service for the club.

For some 17 or 18 years our club has been an AMA Leader Club. That entails being community minded. We participate in activities for school support, Toys for Tots, the Lakeside Western Days Parade and airshow events at nearby airports (Gillespie and Ramona) and activities at the San Diego Air Museum.

There's a lot more history and stories about the "old days" and I may have some dates and details misplaced. If you have details to correct or add, or stories to tell, let me know. Our club doesn't have a complete written history. Some of the early members are still very active in the club and they have contributed much to the character and success of our club. Thank you all.
