
#### 2023 Memorial Day Scale Contest May 20, 2023

<u>Safety Officer Report</u>: <u>Bleed Stop</u>: Ron presented an addition to the First Aid kit which is a powder packet that stops heavy bleeding. When the powder is sprinkled onto a wound, the blood turns to thick syrup. Additional pressure of a bandage helps hold the wound sealed until further aid is found.

Rules Review: No rules were covered this month

#### **Previous events:**

<u>Pylon Races</u>: There was one interesting mid-air in which Glen's prop happened to pick up a little green paint from Eric's aileron, separating the aileron. #### **Old Business:**

#### Shed Roof: Postponed until June. Previous plans/subcontractors fell through.

Speed Limit Sign: The sign post at the entrance to the parking area was knocked over by County workers. Ron arranged for them to re-sink the post.

Pylon Racing info: Frank Gagliardi gave Ron two feather flags for us to use. Also, new member Dave Yost offered flags and concrete-filled 5-gallon buckets for anchors. We'll hold that offer in reserve for now as we have two sets of flags to work with.

Keith shared some information that Discount Hobby Warehouse (local) can't get stock of the FMS 800mm T-28's due to Horizon Hobby having no stock. However, FMS themselves have



stock at \$159 each with free shipping. And their shipping is FAST – I had two arrive in two days!

#### **New Business:**

Show and Tell: Ken Lawrence presented his Albatros B.I. The Albatros B.I, (post-war company designation L.1) was a German military reconnaissance aircraft designed in 1913 and which saw service during World War I [courtesy Wikipedia]. Ken's Albatros weighs in at a mere 18 ounces and is powered by a Rimfire-300 equivalent brushless motor on 950 mAh 3-cell LiPo packs. His maiden was near the end of April and he reports it lifted off in just a few feet with no trim required! It's a slow, smooth and graceful model. The faux engine is hand-crafted. Controls are all pull-pull true to the full-scale plane. He followed the traditional German text marking methods when applying his AMA and FAA numbers, with graphics provided by Callie Graphics.

The meeting adjourned at 9:24 am.
